Key Conclusion 1: Too many older people living in care homes quickly become institutionalised. Their personal identity and individuality rapidly diminishes and they have a lack of choice and control over their lives.

<p>WCBC has two advocacy contracts in place. A contract with Dewis CIL to provide independent advocacy for people who use services commissioned by WCBC to support people to express their views, empowering them to lead more independent lives and ensure they are able to secure their rights and make informed choices. The Council also has a contract with Advocacy Works which provides a single issue Advocacy Service for people with mental health issues. This may include people who require specialist communication tools for example people who have a sensory or other neurological impairment, and are unable to communicate verbally. Both contracts are used fully and provide advocacy services for residents in care home settings. Advocacy is used regularly to support service users as part of the safeguarding process and has been used to support residents through two care home closures in the past year.</p> <p>The new Regional service specification for Care homes providing care for people living with Dementia requires: <i>Decision making agreements are used to ensure that service users living with dementia with capacity or communication issues are supported to record their decisions. Access to independent advocacy is enabled.</i></p>		<p>Whilst these contracts deliver advocacy services to people resident in care homes neither contract mentions specifically delivering advocacy services in care home settings – this will be rectified as the contracts come up for renewal by April 2016. To monitor and evaluate the use of advocacy services by service users in care home settings as part of contract monitoring during 15/16. <p>WCBC Reablement Team already works with people living within care homes and has had a number of successful outcomes for Older People who have been supported to move out of a care home setting to live in their own home. As part of the intermediate care fund initiatives during 14/15 intermediate care services and falls services have been expanded to include working with residents in care homes as part of the unscheduled care agenda to help prevent avoidable admissions to hospital and support timely discharge from hospital. As part of the intermediate care service development step up /step down beds have been commissioned in Residential and EMI Residential care homes supported by intermediate care nursing and therapy services. This has supported the development and delivery of rehabilitation in care home settings.</p> <p>Reablement training has been provided to all care staff within council run services to ensure the reablement approach is maintained across all services. Plans are now being developed to deliver this training to the independent sector.</p>		<p>WCBC to continue to work with BCUHB to ensure specialist services are fully available to and accessed by Older People living in care homes as part of the continued development of intermediate care services and the focus on expanding and enhancing community based services during 15/16. <p>WCBC invests significantly in training and development opportunities for the independent sector including care homes. Dementia Awareness training is made available to all staff across the sector.</p> <p>The new Regional service specification for Care homes providing care for people living with Dementia requires: all new staff members undertake a planned induction programme that includes approaches and skills needed in caring for service users living with dementia; care homes provide evidence of a specialist training programme for all staff that will equip them to care for service users living with dementia based on the Skills for Care Knowledge Set for Dementia; and that staff continually develop their skills and knowledge about service users living with dementia through practice based training.</p>		<p>To monitor attendance at training as part of contract monitoring and to identify improvements required as appropriate. 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<p>There are a range of befriending schemes available in Wrexham however it is not clear what level of activity takes place with citizens living in care homes.</p> <p>WCBC contracts team has commenced a peer support programme for care home owners as a sub group to the care home owners' forum, to improve the level of activity, socialisation and community engagement available to and experienced by residents in care homes.</p> <p>WCBC has launched the development of Community Agents across the Borough. A key part of the Community Agent's role is to tackle social isolation experienced by Older People and to facilitate stronger communities. There is potential for this work to identify positive links with care homes.</p>	<p>To include an audit of the use of volunteering, befriending and intergenerational activities within care homes as part of the contract monitoring activity and address as required. <p>WCBC adult social care department has a 'Getting Engaged' strategy. As part of this Older People have been trained as peer reviewers, and have been working with service users in receipt of domiciliary care and day services to ensure quality of life issues are addressed as part of the review process. This now needs to be extended to include care homes.</p> <p>WCBC has a robust contracts team who include direct dialogue with residents in care homes and their families etc. as part of the contract monitoring process within care homes. 50% of residents and their families are spoken to at every monitoring visit. Quality of life is also included in the annual review process with each service user. However the feedback and outcome data obtained is not as coordinated as it could be to drive continuous improvement and enable proactive quality management. Work is underway to better integrate the social care, safeguarding and contracts review processes and information. A project has already commenced to improve information sharing between WCBC and BCUHB contracts monitoring officers to ensure key performance data is shared in a timely and coordinated way.</p> <p>Better integrated engagement with Older People has been highlighted as a priority action within the regional statement of intent with BCUHB.</p> <p>WCBC runs an effective Provider forum for all care home owners.
